

ROAD CROSSING Behaviour

In last week's newsletter, we shared our concerns about unsafe road crossing behaviour that had been witnessed the week before. Unfortunately the message does not seem to have gotten through, after a Junior student was seen on Monday morning, crossing Devine Road with their grandparent, in full view of the road patrol. We ask that you pass on the message to everyone that picks up and drops off children, including grandparents, that they must model great road crossing behaviour to keep our tamariki and whānau safe, by always using the pedestrian crossing.



We also ask that you refrain from calling your child/children over the road outside the front gate, to avoid children (or parents) crossing the road in front of parked cars.

ASSESSMENT & REPORTING

Mid Year Reports 2021

Assessment and reporting on learning are core practices at Tamahere Model Country School. We have a well-planned teaching and learning model as well as a carefully scheduled assessment plan. Throughout the year students are assessed in many ways. Some of these ways are informal including observations of classroom interactions and conversations during the learning process. Other methods are more formal and include tests that are standardised and norm-referenced. The process of deciding where a student is working in relation to the N.Z. curriculum is made with the support of colleagues and a moderation process that is shared with all staff members. Assessments are used along with teacher judgement to determine where a child is working *independently and most of the time*.

After the July holiday break, we will be sharing with you the mid-year reports for 2021. In early Term Three, we will be inviting families into school for a parent/student conference and this is a time to unpack the reports in more detail. The report is a snapshot of where the students are working independently in the **middle of the year**.

Students have two more terms of learning to go before we report on their end of year results. In December you will receive an end of year report that will show where your child is working after a full year of learning. There is still a great deal of teaching and learning to take place between now and December.

Below is a further explanation of the process of reporting to the Board and parents.

Mid Year Reports 2021

In July (Term Two), 2021, all teachers will provide every parent with a written report outlining their child's progress in relation to the N.Z. Curriculum.

The report provided parents with:

- Information on their child's progress in Reading, Writing and Maths and the other curriculum areas. This was a report that showed where each student was achieving in relation to the end of year expectations for Years 1-6.
- The curriculum expectations can be expressed as curriculum levels. These are as follows:
- o At the end of Year One (Early Level One)
- o At the end of Year Two (At Level One)
- o At the end of Year Three (Early Level Two)
- o At the end of Year Four (At Level Two)
- o At the end of Year Five (Early Level Three)
- o At the end of Year Six (At Level Three)

ROARING 20s FUNDRAISING GALA - 3rd JULY



Property Update - June 2021

As you look around our school, you can't help but notice that there is a lot going on with regard to property projects. We thought it would be helpful to outline what projects have been completed, what is planned and how all these exciting projects are funded.

School property projects are funded from multiple sources and it is often puzzling to those looking on, why some projects are underway when others seem to languish. This table might be useful to help clarify what is funded by the Ministry and which projects rely on the goodwill and fundraising efforts of the school community.

2020 was a year we all remember as one that halted many external fundraising efforts. This meant we were considerably lower on funds for the 'nice to have' projects. We were not able to have Pumpkin Night, Quiz Night, discos, the ball and many other events. In addition to this, the school owned After School Care facility was significantly impacted, which affected our overall funds to use as a school. This year we really have gone all out to make up for some of those lost opportunities, in the hope we can achieve the playground projects and bring them to completion.

Funding Sources

Here is a very brief summary of *some* of the sources of revenue for the school in relation to property projects: <u>5 Y.A.</u>

Every five years a set amount of money is allocated to each school in New Zealand to be spent on upgrading and improving **existing property**. The Government sets the budget and a professional project manager is appointed to set out a plan for the expenditure of these funds. There are very tight guidelines on what it **can** and **cannot** pay for.

S.I.P. School Investment Package

What it is: This was a ONE OFF fund allocated in 2019.

A capital injection accelerating upgrade works at schools that would otherwise be deferred due to a lack of available funds. The School Investment Package is an opportunity for schools to bring forward their discretionary projects and enhance their facilities.

Cyclical Maintenance Fund

The school takes a percentage of their operation grant and puts this aside each year to build up a fund for ongoing painting of the school.

Roll Growth Funding

This is allocated to schools when the Ministry Of Education deem that a school's roll has exceeded the capacity of it's current classrooms. It is fully funded by the Ministry of Education.

Fund raising-

This is the money raised by the P.T.A, After School Care and other associated support groups and can be used for the projects that Ministry of Education funding **cannot** be used for. The school pool and the new playground is one example where local fundraising can achieve goals that go beyond the parameters of the Government funding.

<u>Grants</u>

The school applies for grants from various sources from time to time. These often supplement local fundraising efforts.



Donations of materials are continuing to come in and we'd also like to thank the Straka family and Trade Depot.














COL Robotics Workshop for Year 5 & 6's
